

Exploring Macon's Battles

nalyses of the battles fought in North Georgia and Atlanta, preceding Sherman's March to the Sea, have overshadowed those fought in Middle Georgia. But there were significant battles, especially in

Macon, which served as a cornerstone of the Confederacy's military operations. The city's importance as a transportation and supply hub made it a significant Federal target. Our speaker, Niels Eichorn, earned his Ph.D. in history from the University of Arkansas. His articles of Civil War diplomacy and the American Nineteenth Century have been published in Civil War History and

The Strength of Heaven: A Prayer for March

St. Patrick:

Born in Scotland, kidnapped to and enslaved in Ireland, St. Patrick's life exemplifies many values of what we now call Celtic Christianity. After escaping his harsh captors, he vowed to return to the people who had treated him so cruelly, to preach the gospel and serve the needy. For his selflessness, the nation honors him as their patron saint.

This excerpt from a prayer traditionally ascribed to St. Patrick exemplifies a hallmark of Celtic belief and practice, namely an emphasis on the relation of Creation to spirituality. Unlike other traditions within Christianity, that typically shy away from anything that might smack of paganism, Celts continued to embrace and give voice to their convictions that Nature and Nature's God appropriately inform one's religion.

I arise today
Through the strength of
heaven;
Light of the sun,
Splendor of fire,
Speed of lightning,
Swiftness of the wind,
Depth of the sea,
Stability of the earth,
Firmness of the rock.
I arise today
Through the mighty strength
Of the Lord of creation.

Passages: Past Presidents Jerry Colley and Dennis Kelly

In February, two of our Atlanta Civil War Round Table past presidents Jerry Colley, who served from 1985-86, and Dennis Kelly, who followed him at the helm from 1986-87, died. We report the passage of these two remarkable men with heavy hearts, yet rejoicing in their singular lives and in their invaluable contributions to our community and the study of the American Civil War.

Jerry Colley (1944-2021)

n Atlanta native and life-long history buff, past president Jerry Colley was active in the ACWRT for many years and also a founder of the Atlanta WWII Round Table. He

died of complications from leukemia February

17. After attending St. Pius X Catholic High School, Jerry received a BBA in Accounting from Georgia State

University in 1966; his Master of Professional

Accountancy, also from GSU in 1968 and his GSU Master of Taxation in 1983. Jerry served in the Finance Corps of the U.S. Army from February 1968 until his honorable discharge in 1969. His military service took him to Ft.

Benning, Ft. Ord in California and for one year to Vietnam at Long Binh, where he was in charge of payrolls for Vietnamese workers on the post. He was there during the Tet attacks on the base and manned a perimeter bunker.

While in the Army, he also taught accounting for the

University of Maryland Ling Binh Campus. Jerry married

Gloria, his wife of 51 years, after his return from Vietnam. His career in finance was distinguished. He worked for two years as a Senior Accountant for what is now Price Waterhouse Coopers in the Atlanta office, then as Secretary-Treasurer and CFO of an Atlanta real estate development company. Jerry was founder and majority owner of Colley & Kise, CPAs with offices in Stone Mountain, Tucker, and Duluth. A member of Delta Sigma Pi, national business fraternity, Beta Gamma Sigma, national honorary business society, and Beta Alpha Psi, national honorary accounting society, Jerry taught for many years as an adjunct instructor of accounting at DeKalb College (now GSU) and Emory University. Notably, in civic life, Jerry served as campaign manger for Andrew Young.

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

Jerry and Gloria enjoyed family bicycle rides with their two young sons, Michael and Mark. This led to a new area of endeavor. After years as head of Colley & Kise, Jerry arranged for an employee to purchase the firm and he became Executive Director of Bicycle Rides Across Georgia, an original and successful venture. As a consultant, Jerry helped others to set up similar programs. Jerry and Gloria lead bicycle tours all over the world, traveling with groups to many far-flung destinations, including Austria, France, and New Zealand. Jerry was also a passionate supporter of Veterans' causes. He volunteered often for the Georgia Veterans Day Parade.

A funeral Mass was offered at St. Brendan's Catholic Church in Cumming on February 25. Dennis Kelly (1945-2021)

ast President Dennis Kelly's life ended in Shepherdstown, West Virginia, near Harper's Ferry, last month. The cause of death is unknown, there are no known survivors and no known commemorations have taken place.


Dennis' good friend historian Keith Bohannon of the University of West Georgia and colleagues from the National Park service are working to prepare an obituary with details of Dennis' exceptional life. Willie Ray Johnson, who was Dennis' colleague at the Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park and a longtime friend described Dennis as "one of the world's most unforgettable characters" and "a masterful researcher and lecturer. He was constantly reading and gathering information, revising his thought to contain more and more insight."

aised in Philadelphia, Dennis was drafted after high school and joined the 82nd Airborne Division of the U.S. Army. He was deployed to serve in the Dominican Republic in April of 1965. After completing this demanding assignment, Dennis

returned to civilian life and earned a degree from Temple University. He then worked for the National Park Service at the Manassas and Stones River Battlefield Parks before joining the staff at Kennesaw. He remained at Kennesaw for over a decade before taking early retirement in 1995. Friends describe him as one who lived life on his own terms, sometimes quixotically. Of Irish descent, Dennis Patrick Kelly had a long love affair with Ireland. "When he was a ranger, he would save up his leave and spend time in Ireland. After he took early retirement, he lived there for some years on a boat. The problem was, he had no experience with boats," said Willie Ray. After years in Ireland followed by a one-year tour of Europe, Dennis eventually returned to Philadelphia and became his mother's primary caregiver until her death. He then moved to West Virginia, about 2012, Willie Ray estimated. A fine writer, Dennis published park

publications and a set of maps that were sold for years at the Kennesaw visitor center. He also wrote for the old *Blue and Gray Magazine*. His intellect and dedication were remarkable "I never failed to learn something from him whenever we spoke." remembered Willie Ray.



Chickamauga: Garrity's Alabama Battery overlooking Moccasin Bend, the Tennessee River, and Chattanooga. (National Park Service Photo)



Atlanta Civil War Round Table Tours



CWRT Congress Talks

The Civil War Round Table Congress offers fascinating content via Zoom and YouTube. Free live programs, Wednesday evenings at 7 p.m., Eastern Standard Time, require pre-registration at cwrtcongress.org. (At the site, click left and then click Speaker Series). A number of the programs are also available to view on the organization's YouTube Channel (CWRT Congress -YouTube) where many videos have been posted. One of these is historian Peter S. Carmichael's presentation, based on his 2018 book *The War for* the Common Soldier: How Men Thought, Fought and Survived in Civil War Armies. Peter is the Robert C. Fluhrer Professor of Civil War Studies and Director of the Civil War Institute at Gettysburg College and the author of five books. Peter's interest in the study of the Civil war began at the Indianapolis Civil War Round Table when he was 14. After earning a bachelors degree at Purdue, Peter completed his masters and a Ph.D. at Pennsylvania State University.

In April: 'Ghosts of Guerrilla Memory'

Historian Matthew C. Hulbert will speak in April of the phenomena and legends of bushwhackers, guerrillas sometimes attached to the Confederacy. Active in the borderlands of Missouri and Kansas during and after the war, their operations were often criminal; yet they became glorified characters of the Old West. Matthew's 2016 book The Ghosts of Guerrilla Memory: How Civil War Bushwhackers Became Gunslingers in the American West analyzes the cultural politics behind American memory of guerrilla warfare in literature and film, at reunions and on the stage. Matthew, who earned his Ph.D. at the University of Georgia in 2015 has written numerous books and articles covering his areas of interest: 19th Century America, the Civil War, antebellum slavery, the technology of warfare, violence in history and memory studies. Now Assistant Professor of History at Hampden-Sydney College, his work has been recognized with many honors.
