Eric Wittenberg in April

Our April speaker, Eric J. Wittenberg, made his first trip to the Gettysburg battlefield as a third-grader. By the end of that trip, he was fully hooked on the Civil War. Eric is an alumnus of Dickinson College the University of Pittsburgh,. Eric is a full-time practicing attorney in private practice.

Eric is an award-winning Civil War historian. His specialty is cavalry operations, with a particular emphasis on the Army of the Potomac's Cavalry Corps. For his time with us, he will focus instead on J.E.B. Stuart's controversial ride at Gettysburg. His first book, *Gettysburg's Forgotten Cavalry Actions*, was named the third winner of the Robert E. Lee Civil War Roundtable of Central New Jersey's Bachelder-Coddington Literary Award in 1998. He is also the author of more than two dozen published articles on Civil War cavalry operations.

Battlefield preservation work is very important to him. He sits on the boards of advisors of the Trevilian Station Battlefield Foundation and the Friends of the Alligator, and has regularly worked with the Civil War Preservation Trust. He is an original member and past president of the Central Ohio Civil War Roundtable. He is the vice president of the Buffington Island Battlefield Preservation Foundation. and serves on the Governor of Ohio's Advisory Commission on the Sesquicentennial of the Civil War.

He maintains a popular and well-regarded blog, Rantings of a Civil War Historian, and is the owner and moderator of the popular Civil War Discussion Group Online.

Eric, his wife Susan, and their two golden retrievers live in Columbus, Ohio.

2011 Richard B. Harwell Book Award Winner Selected

The Harwell Award Committee has selected, Failure in the Saddle: Nathan Bedford Forrest, Joe Wheeler, and the Confederate Cavalry in the Chickamauga Campaign, by David Powell as the 2011 Richard Barksdale Harwell Book Award winner. Mr. Powell will join us in November to present his work and receive the award.

The award was begun in 1989 and named for the Atlanta Round Table's first president, Richard Barksdale Harwell. It was created to recognize the best book on a Civil War subject published in the previous year. See the attached list for a complete listing of the award winners.



150 years ago

- 12 April 1861: The American Civil War began. Confederate troops fired mortar shells at the Federal garrison at Fort Sumter, Charleston Harbor, South Carolina. The garrison surrendered the following day
- **15 April 1861:** President Abraham Lincoln issues a proclamation calling up 75,000 militia for three months service.
- **17 April 1861:** Missouri Governor Jackson condemns President Lincoln's call for volunteers and refuses to comply.
- **20 April 1861:** United States Arsenal at Liberty, Missouri, seized.
