Stephen Wise in December

Dr. Stephen Wise presented an excellent program on the battle of Port Royal to those assembled at the Capital City Club for our December meeting. His knowledge of this battle and the nearby area has raised this action to a new level of importance in the study of the Civil War. Our thanks to him and to the Capital Club for their wonderful service and hospitality.

Camp Lawton the Largest Prison in the World

Our January speaker, Dr. John K. Derden, was a member of the initial faculty cadre when East Georgia College, then Emanuel County Junior College, opened in the fall of 1973. He has served in roles ranging from instructor in history to chair of the Humanities Division at the college.

He holds the A.A. from Reinhardt University and the B.S.Ed., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Georgia.

He has authored or co-authored several works of local history and has presented scholarly papers at the Georgia Association of Historians, the Popular Culture Association, and the Society for French Historical Studies. He has served on the Georgia National Register Review Board, the Georgia Association of Historians and Georgia Civil War Heritage Trails, Inc. He currently leads an annual tour of Sherman's March sites in east central Georgia.

His topic will be Camp Lawton. This short-lived Confederate prison camp, preserved for nearly 150 years, perhaps by its own obscurity, began yielding treasures from the Civil War almost as soon as archeologists began searching for it in southeastern Georgia near Millen. The huge prisoner of war camp occupying 42 acres and designed to hold 40,000 men, was built by a force of 300 prisoners and 500 slaves in September 1864 to relieve congestion at Camp Sumter at Andersonville and to remove the possibility of Gen. W.T. Sherman's army freeing prisoners there.

Don't miss this opportunity to learn of this until now little-known site and the treasures it has yielded thus far.

The importance of the battle was noted by his observation that "10,000 Americans all fell within 400 yards in one battle". The Activities Committee presented Tom a donation for the Lotz House from funds raised by the committee earlier in the year to help them with their continued renovation of the house.

- **19 January 1862:** General Felix Zollicoffer is shot and killed when he accidently crosses the Union line and speaks to Col. S. S. Fry [US] at the battle of Mill Springs
- **30 January 1862:** *USS Monitor*, the first ship featuring a turreted center gun, is launched. The design changes naval warfare forever
