The Race for Washington

Summer 1864

Greg Biggs gave those assembled at our February meeting a top-notch review of the Confederate supply system. The Race for Washington: Summer 1864

Our March speaker will be Gail Stephens. Gail has a BS in International Politics from George Washington University and post graduate work at Johns Hopkins and Harvard Universities. She worked for the Department of Defense for 26 years. Upon retirement, she began to study the American Civil War. She volunteers at Monocacy National Battlefield near Frederick, Maryland. In 2002, she won the National Park Service's E.W. Peterkin award for her contributions to public understanding of Civil War history. Her book, Shadow of Shiloh; Major General Lew Wallace in the Civil War, was released in October 2010 by the Indiana Historical Society Press.

In the fourth summer of the Civil War, a small Confederate army came close to carrying off the improbable - the seizure of Washington, DC. In June 1864, Jubal Early slipped away from the works around Richmond, and moved rapidly through the Shenandoah Valley into Maryland with an army of 16,000. Lee's orders to Early take Washington, which had been stripped of troops to reinforce Grant. The Federal leaders in Washington refused to believe the reports of Early's advance and took no action. The Federal commander in Baltimore, Maj. Gen. Lew Wallace, was convinced, and mustered a small force near Frederick, Maryland. On July 9, in the Battle of Monocacy, Wallace's force managed to hold Early's army an entire day, though outnumbered two to one. Warned by Wallace, Grant put a corps onto steamships to reinforce the defenses of Washington. The race was on. Though the Confederates did not succeed, this little known campaign is one of the most exciting and potentially most momentous of the Civil War.

- 6 March 1862: Battle of Pea Ridge [US]
- 8 March 1862: Battle of Elkhorn Tavern [CS]
- 8 March 1862: The Merrimac (CSS Virginia) battles the USS Congress and the USS Cumberland, destroying both frigates.
- 9 March 1862: The duel of the ironclads, The Monitor and The Merrimac (CSS Virginia). First use of a turreted gun.
- **13 March 1862:** Jefferson Davis orders Robert E. Lee to "...conduct military operations of the armies of the Confederacy."
- 23 March 1862: Battle of Kernstown The first battle of the Shenandoah Campaign, Major General Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson [CS].
