Stephen Davis: What the Yankees Did to Us

Sherman's burning of Atlanta" is a phrase that virtually falls off Atlantans' tongues, but during the war our city suffered physical damage in a lot of other ways: Our speaker for April, Dr. Stephen Davis' topic will be "What the Yankees Did to Us: Sherman's Bombardment and Wrecking of Atlanta". Which is also the title of his upcoming book. His review will include among others: Confederate engineers' stripping or leveling some suburban homes in their fortified lines or fields of fire, the Federal bombardment of 20 July - 25 August; the destruction, by both sides, of houses in no-man's land; the Federals' destruction of exurban houses behind their fortified lines to the Chattahoochee: Confederate demolition, 1 - 2 September, of the reserve ordnance train, which leveled nearby buildings; northern soldiers' dismantling of structures for materials in building their huts during the occupation; Federals' destruction of buildings in the way of their inner defense lines, constructed during October; Union engineers' "authorized" destruction of railroad roundhouses, factory chimneys, freight depots commercial structures: and Federals soldiers' unauthorized arson. 11 - 15 November.

Don't miss this opportunity to hear Steve on his third visit to our Round Table since 1989 and get his insights into this maybe not so well understood phase of Atlanta's history.

- **6 April 1862:** On the first day of the battle of Shiloh/Pittsburg Landing, General Albert Sidney Johnston, commander of the Department of the West is killed while leading an advance against a Federal position in a peach orchard.
- 7 April 1862: Island No. 10, in the Mississippi River downstream from New Madrid, is captured. More than 5,000 Confederates are taken prisoner
- 8 April 1862: Following a disastrous second day at Pittsburg Landing, Confederates withdraw to Corinth, Mississippi

10 April 1862: Battle of Fort Pulaski

12 April 1862: The Great Locomotive Chase

28 April 1862: New Orleans surrenders
