The Battle of Champion Hill

The Battle of Champion Hill was the largest, bloodiest, most significant action of the Vicksburg campaign.

Terry Winschel, our April speaker, is a native of Pittsburgh and a graduate of The Pennsylvania State University. He is a 35-year veteran of the National Park Service who served at Gettysburg, Fredericksburg, Valley Forge, and recently retired as Historian at Vicksburg.

Terry will examine the brutal combat that swirled around Champion Hill on May 16, 1863, and the generalship of Confederate commander John C. Pemberton during this critical stage of the Vicksburg campaign. In the most important action of his military career, Pemberton had failed, and had failed miserably. Utilizing a series of transparencies, Terry will detail the battle action as it developed and examine the command decisions made by Pemberton from deployment to withdrawal of the Confederate army.

British military historian, General J.F.C. Fuller observed that "The drums of Champion's Hill sounded the doom of Richmond." Yet, despite this observation, only a handful of stalwart historians have ventured to analyze the impact of Champion Hill on the Vicksburg campaign and the fate of the Confederate nation. Perhaps more significant than any larger or bloodier action of the Civil War, the Battle of Champion Hill was the decisive action of the Vicksburg campaign, led directly to the fall of the Confederate bastion on the Mississippi River, and arguably sealed the fate of Richmond. The fierce combat which raged on the heights of Champion Hill on May 16, 1863, and the military leadership of John C. Pemberton in particular, thus warrant further investigation.

- **11 April 1863:** Col. Abel Streight leaves Nashville, Tennessee on a raid of Rome, GA
- **30 April 1863:** About noon, Ulysses S. Grant begins crossing the Mississippi and landing U. S. troops south of Vicksburg.
